

Notes for Fee Schedule 2025

Still standing under Common Law as a living man or living woman but using terms that the legal system are familiar with, against them.

1. Notice of Terms and Conditions and Schedule of Fees

- Fill in your names, dates, and details. You can print it out as is or fill in the parts that do not change. It is a good idea to print a few copies out and keep some in your car, house and even take one out with you (you never know).
- **Send it formally by either:**
 - a. Hand delivery;
 - b. Recorded delivery, with tracking number; or
 - c. Witnessed delivery (get a witness to hand deliver it for you).
- **Keep proof of service:**
 - a. Tracking numbers and proof of delivery;
 - b. Take a photo or photo copy of the Notice before posting; and
 - c. If you hand deliver the Notice, take a photo when handing it to the recipient.
- If breached, issue an **Invoice** (see file **Invoice template for fee schedule**) referring to the breach and this schedule.
- **Note:** Fee number 10 **Supply Of Harmful Water** can only be issued if you have done the full process for a binding agreement by acquiescence with the supplier.
- If unpaid, pursue through **County Court Money Claim Online (MCOL)**.

2. Invoice template for fee schedule - Tips for effectiveness.

- Always attach a copy of the served **Notice of Terms and Schedule of Fees** with the invoice.
- Keep a **witness statement or postal proof of service**.
- If unpaid after 30 days, file through **Money Claim Online (MCOL)** — attaching the Notice, proof of service, and invoices.

3. Demand for payment

This template puts you in the same style of communication as a solicitor. Once sent recorded delivery, you'll have evidence you've given a **final demand** before court action.
